

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Library collaboration in RDM

OCLC Research project that produced two reports exploring theory and practice of library collaboration

Mixed methods approach:


- Theoretical analysis (choosing among alternative sourcing options, identifying priorities and managing trade-offs, overcoming obstacles to effective collaboration)
- Qualitative analysis (case studies of successful RDM library collaboration)

Motivated by idea that collaboration is a strategic choice



Case study: Texas Data Repository

Leveraged Texas Digital Library's **existing membership** and track record of collaboration

Created **deep collaborative infrastructure** of working groups, steering committees, and extensive documentation

Cultivated community through planning, implementation, and maintenance

Supported inclusive participation by recognizing differing priorities and resourcing means contribution and benefits won't be equal

Today:

- Shared repository for TDL membership to openly publish data sets
- Community of practice within collaborative setting
- Used by 14 TDL member institutions; over 1,800 data sets (Nov. 2023)
- Executive leadership ultimately rests with the TDL Director



Case study: Portage Network

Project was incubated by trusted organization that provided resources and support

Tackle discrete, well-articulated projects to build momentum through "small wins"

Leverage existing efforts instead of starting from scratch

Start early to remove friction of "switching costs"

Today:

- Transferred from CARL to the the Digital Research Alliance of Canada in 2021
- A library consortia led initiative has become federally funded national infrastructure
- Stability and funding came with some loss of autonomy



Case study: Data Curation Network

Began with **well-defined problem:** to share curation expertise

Start-up model of collaboration required significant transaction costs

Investment in planning

Trusted relationships supported growth

Today:

- Multi-institutional network for data curation
- Learning and training community
- Supported by membership dues
- Governed by a board and executive committee, rather than executive leadership



Recommendations for libraries: Three stages of collaboration

Preparing to collaborate	Establishing a successful collaboration	Stewarding for sustainability
Recognize that collaboration requires investment	Leverage preexisting trust relationships	Plan for success
Balance that trade-off between start-up and consortial models	Find your people	Be strategically ambitious and tactically restrained
Start collaborations early	Cultivate commitment	Align with institutional goals
Value the intangible benefits of collaboration		Recognize that contributions and benefits may be asymmetrical





e.g., research support/RDM


Social interoperability:


Library collaboration: Some emerging general principles
